Adjective-ed/ing (1 Answers)

For these type of adjectives, the base/root is generally a verb that is changed into an adjective by adding the -ed or -ing endings:

Adjective-ed is always used with people or animals to express a feeling

- Ex. I was so **frustrated** when everything closed during the pandemic.
- Ex. We were all **depressed** after our team lost the championship game.

 <u>Adjective-ing</u> is **generally used** with <u>things or situations</u> to express how they make you feel
- Ex. Our vacation was **boring** because it rained almost every day. (It made us feel **bored**)
- Ex. Some drugs are so **addicting** that people can't stop them.

- 12. Helping Tom move to his new house was really **exhausting**. (exhaust)
- 13. John was <u>confused</u> by his new TV's instruction booklet. (confuse)
- 14. People talking on phones in movie theaters is **annoying**. **(annoy)**
- 15. Hearing that a crazy man attacked people with a knife was <u>shocking</u>. I'm getting too <u>worried</u> to go outside these days. (shock/worry)
- 16. The concert was very <u>entertaining</u>. Everyone was so <u>impressed</u> by their <u>amazing</u> stage show. (entertain/impress/amaze)
- 17. The mom was <u>thrilled</u> to see her children after so many years. (thrill)
- 18. These last 2 weeks of 35-degree weather have been so <u>depressing</u>. I was <u>surprised</u> when one day was even 39 degrees! (depress/surprise)
- 19. John was <u>exhausted</u> after working 36 hours in a row. (exhaust)
- 20. Roller coasters are so <u>thrilling</u>. Riding them is really <u>exhilarating</u>! (thrill/exhilarate)
- **Special cases of adj-ing with people: Kim never has anything interesting to say, so she is a **boring** person. (She makes everyone feel **bored**)
