## Quick -vs- Quickly (2)

This sheet works with the differences between adjectives and adverbs!

Adjectives are generally used to modify (change) nouns

He is a very tall man. / He is very tall.

Adverbs are used to modify verbs by adding "ly"

We quietly walked into the room.

\*\*If it ends in "y", change it to "ily"

\*\*Be careful: Some words look like adverbs, but they are not. In this case the adverb is the adjective form.
