Whole -vs- All (1)

Both whole and all mean 100% of something. But whole means a complete something (a whole bottle, a whole year, etc.) and all talks about a total amount of something (all the food, all my friends, etc.)

Whole: a, an, the, personal pronouns (my, your, our, etc.), or a number <u>always</u>, <u>always</u> come before whole, and is followed by a <u>singular noun</u> (or plural if using a number).

It took Joe a **whole** <u>week</u> to drive across America. We watched 3 **whole** seasons of that TV show in one day.

All: a, an, the, personal pronouns (my, your, our, etc.), or a number never, never come before all (they usually come after all)

Dan went on all (of) the rides at the amusement park.

Bill has 5 sisters, and all 5 of them are doctors.
