

# ALMOST rules

## 1. + NOUN

Almost	all	<b>Japanese people</b> like sushi.
	all (of)	<b>the kids</b> had fun today.
	every	<b>thing</b> in Tokyo is expensive.
	no	<b>one</b> likes Donald Trump.
	none of	<b>my friends</b> can cook.

\*(of): you always need: the, my, your, his her, etc.

Imelda Marcos bought new shoes almost every **week**.

I had almost no **money** left after my vacation.

## 2. + Continuing action VERB

I You He We They ...	almost	always	<b>eat</b> rice balls for lunch.
		never	<b>take</b> showers at night.

He almost always **forgets** his wife's birthday.

She almost never **goes** to karaoke.

## 3. + one time only VERB

\*\* always past tense    \*\* it means the situation didn't happen/safe

I You He We They ...	almost	<b>fell</b> down the stairs last night.
	almost	<b>got</b> a perfect score on his test.
	almost	<b>crashed</b> our car when a boy suddenly ran into the street.
