4. My body is so tight. If I **bend** over, I can only reach just past my knees.
5. All the men in the office **fawn(ed)** over the gorgeous new secretary.

hang **win** **see** **spill** **knock**

1. The thieves plan to **knock** over a gas station for some quick cash.
2. With the possible hurricane **hanging** over the city, events were cancelled.
3. We really need to **see** over the house before we can make an offer.
4. I'm trying to **win** over Kim's dad before asking her to marry me.
5. The storm surge was so high that seawater **spilled** over into the airport and flooded the runways.

tide **come** **win** **hang** **flip**

1. I'm making lasagna. Go grab some wine and **come** over!
2. This food and water should **tide** us over till the typhoon passes.
3. With a mountain of debt **hanging** over his head, Ray thought of suicide.
4. The speeding car **flipped** over 5 times after turning a corner too fast.
5. Our new boss tried to **win** us over by taking us all out to lunch.
