The pattern for this worksheet is that something is **too much/many noun**, so you are unable to do some action (**verb**). **too much:** much is used with <u>uncountable</u> nouns **too many:** many is used with <u>countable</u> nouns

## ex.) There is a lot of snow, so we are unable to play outside <u>There's too much snow to play outside</u>
